



REBUILD FOR RESILIENCE

ReBUILD for Resilience is a six-year Research Programme Consortium funded by the UK government's Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO). In ReBUILD for Resilience, we aim to contribute to strengthening resilience (ability to absorb, adapt and transform) and building stronger systems for health across multiple levels and sectors, with a focus on equity, gender, disability, and social inclusion throughout the programme. The aim is also to deliver high-quality, practical, multidisciplinary, operationally-relevant, and scalable health system research. ReBUILD for Resilience will look at health systems in Fragile and Shock-Prone (FASP) settings experiencing conflict, disaster, health systems fragility and other shocks, including the current COVID-19 pandemic.

OUR APPROACHES TO HEALTH SYSTEM STRENGTHENING



Having a well-designed resilience framework to guide the overall project, we will primarily use implementation research methodologies. This includes a range of participatory and innovative approaches, such as learning sites approach for better understanding health system, which are focused on comprehending challenges and testing system strengthening interventions at the local health system level. Our focus will be at the sub-national (provincial and municipal) operational level, but ensuring that the national-local dialogue platform is also supported. Through this project, we will explore how resilience capacities are developed to ensure responsive, effective, inclusive, gender-equitable and sustainable health systems in FASP settings.



ONGOING COVID-19 RAPID RESEARCH PROJECTS

HERD International is implementing two studies on the impact of COVID-19 in different areas:

- (i) Understanding 'Health system resilience to respond to COVID-19 in federalized context with a focus on health workforce management at the sub-national level in Nepal', aiming to understand health sector policy, preparedness, and responses to COVID-19 in federal context of Nepal and the mechanism of health workforce management on two selected municipalities of province 5.
- (ii) A multi-country study on 'Gendered experience of Close to Community (CTC) providers in FASP settings' with the aim to explore the roles of CTC providers, mainly Female Community Health Volunteers (FCHVs) in Nepal and their gendered experiences during the COVID-19 pandemic.
